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1 Introduction to the Research Programme

Connected Worlds: Causes, Consequences, and Institutional Regulation of Transnational Migration

Research programs are learning processes. Outcomes of previous stages of inquiry require the updating of research questions, methods used, and the selection of cases to be studied. This happened in an incremental way during the first years of the research Department “Migration, Integration, Transnationalization”, up to the last evaluation by the WZB Advisory Board in November 2015. Since then, a more fundamental reorientation of the research program has become necessary. Within the previous research program, migration flows were taken as a given, and the investigatory focus was on how receiving nation-states’ institutions and policies shaped immigrant integration outcomes, and how conversely nation-states were transformed by the effects of increased diversity on social cohesion and political polarization. While these remain important foci of our work, it became increasingly clear that the timing and composition of the flow of immigrants was a major factor shaping our outcomes of interest. For instance, comparative studies of European countries revealed that the effects of varying citizenship and cultural diversity policies on key integration outcomes were relatively modest, whereas differences across immigrant groups tended to be much more important.

Upon closer inspection, the more positive integration outcomes of the classical Anglo-Saxon immigration countries (with Canada as the often-heralded exemplary case) are not – or certainly not primarily – due to more efficient citizenship and integration policies, but to the composition of these countries’ immigrant inflows, both in terms of human capital, and countries and regions of origin. Whereas in countries such as Canada and the United States by far the largest share of international migration is “discretionary” in the sense that it is subject to numerical limits and substantive criteria (mostly related to educational credentials, labour-market demand and language proficiency), the overwhelming majority of migration into the European Union is “non-discretionary” (above all asylum seekers, as well as rights-based family migrants).¹ These non-discretionary migrants come overwhelmingly from Muslim-majority countries in the Middle East, South-Central Asia, and North and West Africa. In the Anglo-Saxon immigration countries, by contrast, Muslims make up a very small share of immigrants and of the population in general. This is relevant because, as shown for instance by the World Values Survey, the cultural distance between Western Europe and these regions is larger than with any other part of the world. In turn, cultural distance is, as many of our studies show, a crucial barrier to integration, as well as a source of conflict and discrimination.

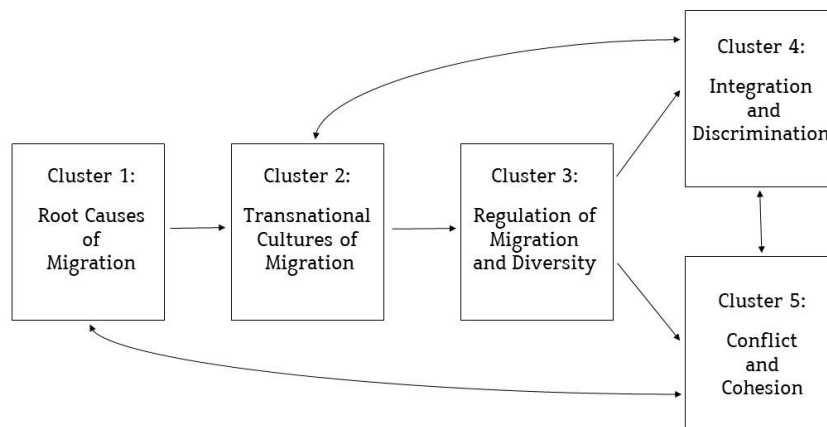
A further reason to revise the original research program was the mounting realization that a substantial part of the integration problems and conflicts faced by European immigration countries have their roots directly in the regions of origin of immigrants. An

area where this became particularly clear since 2015 was the spillover of civil wars in the Middle East into Western Europe, both in the form of Islamist terror attacks on European soil, and the recruitment of thousands of young European Muslims into terror groups fighting in Syria, Iraq, and elsewhere. Because of the social conduits and global ethnoreligious networks of solidarity and identification, conflicts around the world increasingly have faraway consequences. Transnational cultural ties also affect socio-economic integration, for instance the very low labour-market participation rates among female Muslim immigrants, which closely mirror those in the countries of origin.

Against this background, our current research program, visualized in Figure 1, has opened up new lines of inquiry, which investigate the structural and cultural drivers of migration (clusters 1 and 2), the way in which the immigration and asylum policies of the receiving countries channel this migration potential (cluster 3), and the transnational connections between immigrant communities and their regions of origin (the bidirectional arrows). Combining these with our established strands of research (clusters 4 and 5), the current research program consists of five research clusters. While we assign projects to particular research clusters, they of course often deal with the connections among several of them, e.g., how cultures of migration affect integration outcomes in destination countries, or the links between Islamist radicalization in Europe and fundamentalist regimes and movements in the regions of origin.

Figure 1: Structure of the research programme



Cluster 1 deals with various structural drivers of migration in regions of origin: failing democratization, human rights violations, violent conflicts, and climate change. These do not impact on migration directly but are mediated by transnational social (e.g., network connections to diaspora communities) and cultural (e.g., narratives of migration) linkages between origin and destination countries, which are studied in Cluster 2.² The extent to which migration aspirations can be realized depends on the migration policies of destination countries, addressed in cluster 3. Integration and citizenship policies also belong to this cluster, and are a further factor shaping socio-economic and socio-cultural integration outcomes for immigrants, as well as patterns of discrimination they

encounter (cluster 4). Together, policies (e.g., those dealing with religious diversity) and integration outcomes (e.g., ethnic segregation) affect the degree and forms of ethnic and religious conflict related to migration, as well as potential negative impacts of increased diversity on social trust and solidarity (cluster 5). Vice versa, conflicts related to migration, e.g. the simultaneous rise of right-wing populism and Islamic religious fundamentalism, may have negative impacts on integration and reinforce stereotypes and discrimination. The double arrows between clusters 2 and 4 indicate that cultures of migration in origin countries may affect integration outcomes in destination countries, not just through selective migration, but also, e.g., through family pressures on migrants to send remittances. Conversely, the (often embellished) stories that migrants convey back to the origin country shape and reinforce migration aspirations. The double arrow between clusters 1 and 5, finally, indicates that conflicts in destination countries are often linked to those in origin countries. For instance, movements and regimes from origin regions and their local organizational affiliates in destination settings affect religious fundamentalism and radicalization among Muslim immigrant communities. Conversely, diaspora communities may intervene in conflicts in regions of origin, as when thousands of young European Muslims joined the so-called Islamic State. The five clusters and the projects and publications associated with them are described in greater detail in section 6.

3 Organization and Funding

Structurally, the Department has, next to the Director's position, the equivalent of four full-time postdoctoral research positions at its disposition. Tommaso Virgili, Jonas Wiedner, and Irene Pañeda Fernández are the three current postdoctoral research fellows on these WZB-funded positions. The fourth position is used to finance a predoctoral position for Daniel Tuki. From remaining personnel funds (e.g., from leaves of absence and WZB flexible funding) we were able to employ Gülay Türkmen as an additional postdoctoral researcher until the end of 2022. In the context of extraordinary funding ("Sondertatbestand Digitalisierung") for the WZB, the Department has received one additional postdoc position for research on aspects of migration and diversity related to digitalization. At MIT, this position is occupied by Anna Skarpelis. In the past, the central WZB also funded one 0.65 fte to each Department for a predoctoral (PhD-track) position, but this programme was terminated in 2021. Doctoral students who had already been appointed will be funded until the end of the three-year period of their contracts. At MIT, this position is held by Dario Portong. From third-party funding, we employ two further postdoctoral research fellows: Eylem Kanol (MOTRA) and Daniel Meierriecks (TRANSMIT); as well as two predoctoral researchers: Tamara Bogatzki and Julia Stier (both TRANSMIT).

Structural research funding amounts to about 85.000 € per annum, from which student research assistants, travel costs for conferences, fieldwork, and training, as well as copying and a contribution to library subscription costs must be paid. As part of the Department's philosophy to grant researchers a relatively large degree of independence, each postdoctoral research fellow has an annual sum of 3.000 €, and each junior researcher 1.500 € at his or her free disposition for research costs or travel. Funding beyond this amount is available on request. All researchers also have equal access to support by the Department's research assistants.

During the reporting period, 22 different projects received third-party funding for a total value of 4.6 million €. Main funding sources were the German Research Foundation (DFG, 2 million €), the Ministries of Family (1.3 million €) and of Education and Research (620.000 €), the European Union (306.000 €) and the Leibnitz Foundation (219.000 €) (see section 9 for a full overview).

Communication within the Department is assured by the weekly colloquium of the Research Area Migration and Diversity, which offers a stage for both internal presentations of work in progress, as well as external speakers. On a rotational basis, research fellows are in charge of the colloquium programme, and have a large degree of freedom, as well as a yearly budget of 5.000€ to invite speakers of their and their colleagues' choice. The Department has a "culture of presence". Research fellows can work in home office for one day a week, as well as for up to two weeks a year for longer periods. Apart from that, researchers are expected to work from their office at the WZB. This leads to a relatively high degree of mutual exchange, learning, and collaboration, as is testified by the high number of papers co-authored with MIT colleagues. Particularly for researchers at the beginning of their careers, this "workshop" environment greatly enhances academic development and has contributed to our very good career placement track record (see section 4 and 7).

An important measure of the success of the collaborative working culture at the Department is the fact that several former researchers have maintained institutional ties to us, and continue to write papers with MIT staff. After leaving the WZB for a professorship at the University of Bamberg and subsequently the University of Mannheim, Marc Helbling became a part-time distinguished research fellow at the Department, and located his third-party funded IMPETUS project with us, allowing the appointment of Daniel Meierrieks. Sarah Carol and Merlin Schaeffer likewise located their DFG-funded WELLMOB project in the Department, allowing the appointment of Jonas Wiedner. Merlin Schaeffer also located his DFG-funded APAX project with us, allowing the appointment of Judith Kas. After taking up a junior professorship at the University of Hamburg, Max Schaub continues to participate in our colloquia and is still involved in projects with staff members. Ines Michalowski, finally, invited two MIT postdoctoral researchers (Eylem Kanol and Jonas Wiedner) to substitute her Chair at the University of Münster while she spends her research sabbatical here at MIT.

Since 2013, the Department has hosted the Annual Conference on Migration and Diversity, organized by varying combinations of MIT researchers. Topics since 2016 were: “Institutional and Policy Experiments in Research on Migration, Ethnic Relations, and Intergroup Relations” (organizers Ruth Dittmann and Marc Helbling); “Ten Years of Research on ‘Migration, Integration, Transnationalization’: What Have We Learned? Where Are We Going?” (Ruud Koopmans); Religious Fundamentalism and Violence: Causes and Mechanisms” (Anselm Hager, Eylem Kanol, and Ruud Koopmans); and “Minority and Majority Rights” (Ruud Koopmans and Liav Orgad). After a two-year interruption in 2020 and 2021 because of the corona pandemic, the 8th Annual Conference was held in September 2022 on the topic “Does Culture Matter for Integration? Empirical Patterns and the Regulation of Difference”, organized by Gülay Türkmen, Dario Portong, Tommaso Virgili, and Jonas Wiedner. Participation in the conferences is partly by invitation and partly by an open call for papers. Since the last two conferences, we augmented the tradition with an Annual Distinguished Lecture on Migration and Diversity on the eve of the conference, which was held by Will Kymlicka in 2019 and Richard Alba in 2022.

4 Career Development and Placement

Participation in external training programmes, in particular in research methods, is encouraged and financed by the Department. Leave for research stays abroad and temporary teaching positions outside Berlin is generously granted if it serves the development of a researcher's profile on the academic job market (for an overview see section 8). For instance, Eylem Kanol is currently on a six-month leave of absence as substitute Chair (Lehrstuhlvertretung) in Sociology of Religion at the University of Münster.

In the reporting period (2016–2022), seven dissertations were completed within the Department (Liv Bjerre, Eylem Kanol, Judith Kas, Irene Pañeda Fernández, Anselm Rink, Jonas Wiedner, and Ruta Yemane). Four more were completed in affiliation with the Department (see section 8 for an overview).

Researchers leaving the Department is an emotionally ambiguous output measure, but in an institution like the WZB, which structurally seeks to maintain an adaptive research agenda and wants to remain open to new generations of upcoming scholars, it is inevitable. It is crucial, then, that WZB research staff members are socialized and enabled during their stays at WZB in a way that advances their careers. Looking at the current positions of former MIT staff members in section 7, we can conclude that we have been quite successful in this regard. Six former postdocs at MIT have meanwhile become full university professors: Ruth Ditlmann, Fenella Fleischmann, Marc Helbling, Ines Michalowski, Elmar Schlüter, and Céline Teney. One is professor at a university of applied sciences (Rahim Hajji). Others have become associate professors (Bram Lancee, Merlin Schaeffer) or assistant/junior professors (Sarah Carol, Anselm Hager, Max Schaub, and Oliver Strijbis). Again others are researchers at universities (Daniel Auer, Bernd Beber, Evelyn Ersanilli; the latter with an ERC starting grant) or at non-university research institutes (Susanne Veit, Ruta Yemane). Only few former predoctoral or postdoctoral researchers have continued their careers outside academia. Noteworthy is finally that six of our student research assistants and project assistants have gone on to pursue PhDs in Germany, elsewhere in Europe, or in the United States. One former student assistant returned after his PhD at the University of Cologne as a postdoc to MIT (Jonas Wiedner); another (Hanno Hilbig) moved after his PhD at Harvard to a postdoctoral fellowship at Princeton University.

5 Publication Strategy and Output

The Department's publication strategy privileges high-quality, international publications. This entails an emphasis on English-language publications, and in particular a preference for monographs and articles in high-quality journals. However, other types of publications are not discouraged because they may be important in other respects, e.g. to reach non-academic or specialised academic audiences or to attain national visibility and policy impact. Rather, the optimal publication output is seen as comprising a variety of types, however with an emphasis on publications of the types mentioned. Table 1 provides an overview of the number of publications of various types in the period since the last evaluation by the WZB Advisory Board, as well as within the more limited time period 2019–2021.

Comparing the output on a yearly basis between the current (2016–2022) and the previous (2011–2015) evaluation period, there are a number of noteworthy trends. Whereas output in the form of peer-reviewed journal articles increased by about one third, the number of articles in edited volumes declined by forty percent. This is a long-term trend that was already visible comparing the 2011–2015 to the 2007–2010 period, and is in line with our publication strategy, because edited volume contributions tend to have much less citation impact and render less reputational benefit for the job market.

Accordingly, also the number of volumes of which MIT members were editors has decreased by more than half.

Less welcomed is the reduction in the category of monographs, especially considering the fact that seven of the eleven listed in the table were dissertations that were published only as a university manuscript, but not as a proper book. Here, we probably pay the price of the strong focus on journal articles as a career advancement strategy among young scholars, who have the feeling they cannot afford to invest the time that the writing of a monograph requires. In this sense, the German and European academic culture in social sciences seems to have diverged from that in the United States, where converting the dissertation into a book and subsequently aiming for a “second book” to make a next step on the academic ladder continue to be career strategies followed by many young researchers that are also rewarded by many hiring and promotion committees.

Strong and welcome increases can be noted in the two publication categories that entail dissemination to non-academic audiences. Contributions to the WZB quarterly *Mitteilungen* almost doubled, and blog posts, articles and interviews³ in newspapers and magazines even increased fivefold. The reasons for this strong increase are on the one hand the spread of blogposts and online media as new publication formats, and the increased public and political attention for the themes of the Department in the wake of the so-called refugee crisis of 2015-2016, on the other.

Between 2016 and 2022, MIT members published articles in 81 different journals (of which 57 during 2019-2021). Journals are spread across a range of disciplines, including political science (24 journals), economics (14), sociology (9), and (social) psychology (8). In addition, we published in topical interdisciplinary journals in the field of migration, ethnic relations, and demography (10), as well as in other topical fields (10) such as religion, terrorism, and climate change.

6 Research Clusters and Projects

Cluster 1: Root Causes of Migration

This research cluster deals with structural drivers of migration from the countries of the Middle East and Sub-Saharan Africa to Europe. In his German-language monograph, *Das verfallene Haus des Islam* (2020a), which was also translated into Dutch and Danish, Ruud Koopmans showed how the rise of religious fundamentalism across Muslim-majority countries since the end of the 1970s has led to economic stagnation, blocked democratization and a spike in civil wars and terrorism in this part of the world, which have displaced dozens of millions, some of whom have sought refuge in Europe. Two other book projects look at these connections more in depth for specific countries. Gülay Türkmen's *Under the Banner of Islam* (2021a) focuses on the intersection of Islam and the Kurdish conflict in Turkey.⁴ In a new project, Türkmen focuses on the impact of democratic decline on high-skilled migration from Turkey. In *Islam, Constitutional Law and Human Rights* (2022a), Tommaso Virgili shows the impact of legal norms rooted in fundamentalist interpretations of Islam on the rights of sexual minorities and atheists and religious dissenters in Egypt and Tunisia, before and after the Arab Spring. He is currently extending this analysis to Morocco, and analyzing new developments in the context of authoritarian backsliding in Tunisia. Irene Pañeda Fernández's research in the context of the TRANSMIT project (see cluster 2) also focuses on human rights violations as a driver of migration. Based on data from Senegal and the Gambia she investigates how gender violence and inequality affect female migration aspirations.

Several projects in this research cluster investigate ethno-religious conflicts and violence as drivers of migration. In a series of journal articles in the context of the project "The international political economy of terrorism and migration" Daniel Meierrieks, partly in collaboration with Daniel Auer and Marc Helbling, has investigated the relationship between terrorism and economic inequality, the effects of arms exports on violent conflict, and the impacts of terrorism on migrant flows and migration policies.⁵ In his dissertation project, "Intercommunal violence in Nigeria" in the context of the larger TRANSMIT project (see below) Daniel Tuki looks at the roles of religious fundamentalism, economic competition, demography, and climate change in explaining the wave of deadly violence involving Islamic herdsmen of the Fulani people, whose Southward migration has brought them into conflict with sedentary, mostly Christian farmers.⁶ Also as part of the larger TRANSMIT project, Max Schaub and Daniel Auer (2022) have shown how the wish to evade recruitment efforts by rebel groups has driven young male migration from the Senegalese Casamance region.

A final project in this research cluster, involving Daniel Auer, Marc Helbling, Daniel Meierrieks and Max Schaub, is entitled "Socio-economic consequences of climate change

and international migration". The project was partly funded by a research grant from the Leibniz Foundation. Several journal papers demonstrate that climate change has a noticeable impact on migration, both international and within countries to urban centers; how it does so differently for low-skilled and high-skilled migrants; and that attitudes in Europe towards migrants driven by climate change are – at least for now – more positive than towards other categories of migrants.⁷

Cluster 2: Transnational Cultures of Migration

At the centre of this research cluster is the large project TRANSMIT – “Transnational Perspectives on Migration and Integration”, which is led by Irene Pañeda Fernández and funded by the German Ministry of Family Affairs. The project involves multiple-wave surveys in the Casamance region and the capital Dakar of Senegal, in the Gambia, and in the Nigerian federal states of Edo and Kaduna. Two waves have so far been conducted in Senegal and the Gambia, and one in Nigeria. In 2023, a survey among immigrants from West Africa living in Germany will be conducted.

In her article-based dissertation project “Essays on migration and culture” within the context of TRANSMIT, Tamara Bogatzki focuses on three topics: how Senegalese family histories of ancestors who fought in Europe for the French army influence today’s migration aspirations; how diaspora network effects depend on collectivist or individualist cultures in origin countries⁸; and why Nigerian women trust themselves in the hand of traffickers even though it is widely known that in Europe many will end up in coerced prostitution. In her dissertation monograph project, entitled “The constriction and consequences of collective imaginaries in the context of Senegalese migration”, Julia Stier shows how stories and images of migrants’ lives in Europe shape the perception of migration among families and friends in the countries of origin. Because various mechanisms produce a bias towards stories of success, these “imaginaries” contribute to reproducing migration aspirations – even when migration entails high risks and slim chances of success. The study combines TRANSMIT survey data with qualitative fieldwork among migrants, returnees, and their families in Senegal, Italy, and Germany.

Cluster 3: Regulation of Migration and Diversity

The third factor shaping migration flows are the immigration policies of receiving countries. Apart from migration policies, this cluster also looks at the policies and institutions that shape the integration of immigrants, and particularly how host societies deal with cultural and religious diversity.⁹ The “Immigration Policies in International Comparison” (IMPIC) project, which was financed by an Emmy Noether grant for Marc Helbling, investigated causes and consequences of immigration policies across 33 OECD countries for the period 1980–2010 and four types of migration: labour, asylum, family reunification, and co-ethnic. Besides methodological and descriptive contributions¹⁰,

the project's publications addressed policy impacts on migration flows¹¹, on voting behavior¹², as well as on immigrant integration¹³. In her dissertation project, Liv Bjerre combined IMPIC data and qualitative case-studies of three Scandinavian countries to investigate policy impacts on asylum and irregular migration. Contrary to what is sometimes claimed, she shows that receiving states are not powerless when it comes to regulating these forms of migration.¹⁴

Since the last audit by the WZB Advisory Board in 2015, the so-called “refugee crisis” has brought several millions of new immigrants into the European Union, but has also contributed to political polarization and the rise of right-wing populist challenges. In his new book project, *The Asylum Lottery: A Balance of European Asylum Policies from 2015 to the Ukraine War and How We Can Do Better*, which will be published in German and Dutch in the Spring of 2023, Ruud Koopmans shows how current asylum policies produce many unintended negative side-effects and fail to help the neediest refugees. He proposes an alternative system that combines resettlement, humanitarian visa, new labour migration channels, and extra-territorialization of asylum procedures for irregular migrants.¹⁵

Turning now to integration policies, Ruud Koopmans and Ines Michalowski extended the “Indicators of Citizenship and Integration Policies” (ICRI) project to include 29 countries across all continents, and sought to explain why some states have been more prone to extend rights to immigrants than others.¹⁶ Ruth Ditlmann turned the perspective on citizenship around, and investigated how ordinary Germans view national identity and what it means to be German.¹⁷ Ines Michalowski continued her research into the accommodation of cultural and religious diversity in public institutions.¹⁸ In the “BODYRULES” project (funded by the German Ministry of Education and Research), she and Max Behrendt surveyed over 300 swimming pools in Germany over their accommodation of body practice claims by Muslims (burkini, segregated swimming hours for women). They found high levels of accommodation, but conflicts were likely where both rates of populist right voting were high and the immigrant population large.¹⁹

In her project “Racial vision: Power, technology, and the social impacts of ethno-racial classifications” Anna Skarpelis investigates how “race” as a social category is constructed in different societies and historical periods, and how these classifications are constructed and enhanced by technology. Among other things she looks at the use of photography for racial categorization in Nazi Germany and Imperial Japan, and how computer vision engineers create synthetic data to fix bias in facial recognition, with unintended but impactful consequences. Together with Irene Pañeda Fernández, she is

preparing a vignette-study into nationally-specific forms of racial classification of football players in Germany, Spain, and possibly other countries.

In the final project of this cluster, “Majority and Minority Rights”, Ruud Koopmans and Liav Orgad look at the tensions between multicultural minority rights, on the one hand, and increasingly assertive claims of cultural majorities, on the other. Combining normative, legal, and empirical perspectives they developed a fourfold typology of constellations, in which the normative power of rights claims varies by whether minorities and majorities are indigenous/native or of immigrant/settler origin.²⁰ An edited volume on the topic, entitled *Majorities, Minorities, and the Future of Nationhood*, brings together leading scholars on the topic and appears in November 2022.²¹

Cluster 4: Integration and Discrimination

Projects in this cluster focus on the relationships among three social processes: socio-cultural integration (e.g., language acquisition, segregation, ethnic communities), socio-economic (particularly labour-market) integration, and discrimination.²² Examples of work on socio-cultural integration are Jutta Höhne and Ines Michalowski’s paper on effects of language courses on language acquisition and interethnic contacts; and Sarah Carol’s papers on partner choice, gender preferences for children, and the role of religion in youth delinquency.

A larger project, “Socio-spatial conditions of immigrant integration and wellbeing”, received initial funding from the German Science Foundation (project WELLMOB), and involves Jonas Wiedner, Sarah Carol and Merlin Schaeffer. The project collects original, geospatial data on ethno-religious organizational infrastructures (associations, houses of worship, groceries, etc.) in Germany and combines them with survey data to investigate beneficial and detrimental effects of ethnic enclaves and segregation on immigrant integration and wellbeing, and how these differ across ethnic groups and generations. Results show that cultural distance of migrants’ sending countries to receiving societies is a major driver of the establishment of distinct minority civil societies, which enhance life satisfaction particularly for migrants oriented towards their origin countries.²³ The project also looks at the mobility of recent refugees and finds that those who leave the places where they were originally allocated tend to move to places with weak labor markets, partly because they are attracted by ethnic infrastructures.

The connection between socio-cultural and labour-market integration is also addressed in a paper by Ruud Koopmans, who shows for six European countries that labour-market participation and unemployment differentials between Muslim immigrants and native ethnics can be largely explained by language deficits, limited interethnic contacts, and, where women are concerned, conservative gender values.²⁴ The importance of language for labour-market outcomes is also demonstrated in Daniel Auer’s paper on

random allocation of refugees in Switzerland, which exploits the fact that some refugees (especially those from countries where French is a *lingua franca*) are allocated to regions whose language they speak, while others are “mismatched”.²⁵ Further papers on labour-market integration address topics such as effects of technological change²⁶, access to labour market measures²⁷, and ethnic skill gaps caused by second-generation immigrants’ high educational aspirations conditional on academic performance.²⁸

Whereas the above projects focus on characteristics of immigrants and ethnic communities in explaining integration outcomes, a second set of projects in this cluster focuses on the role of discrimination. The project “Ethnic discrimination in the labour market in comparative perspective” was initiated by Ruud Koopmans, Bram Lancee, Susanne Veit, and Ruta Yemane and later supported by a collaborative Horizon 2020 grant (GEMM). It is the first cross-national study using the experimental “correspondence method” to investigate labour-market discrimination against second-generation immigrants. Results show high rates of discrimination in the United Kingdom and the Netherlands, and lower rates in Germany and Spain. The project pioneered the simultaneous testing of discrimination along racial/phenotypical, ethnic, and religious lines and found that phenotypical blacks and Muslims suffer higher levels of discrimination, whereas against other non-Christian religions (Hinduism, buddhism) as well as Asian phenotypes no significant discrimination was detected. The degree of cultural distance between origin and settlement countries offers the best explanation for these patterns.²⁹ Ruta Yemane’s dissertation project extended the study to the United States. Among other things she could show that, contrary to what is sometimes claimed, religion is not less important as a target of discrimination in the USA. In fact, phenotypically white Muslims faced higher discrimination rates than non-white non-Muslims.³⁰ A survey experiment among Swiss employers by Daniel Auer confirmed the importance of cultural distance and showed that it matters more for high-skilled occupations.³¹

In a project funded by the German Science Foundation, “The association between perceived and actual discrimination” (APAX) Judith Kas and Merlin Schaeffer examine what has been called the “integration paradox”, the recurrent finding that better integrated people with a migration background tend to perceive more discrimination than marginalized immigrants.³² Existing data do not allow to disentangle why this is the case. Results of experimental trust games indicate that misperceptions of discrimination occur only when ethnicity is primed, suggesting that exposure to discourses emphasizing ethnic differences is responsible for the enhanced perception of discrimination among successful immigrants. In her dissertation project “trust and reputation in the peer-to-peer platform economy” Judith Kas (see also the next research cluster) also investigated digital discrimination and trust on peer-to-peer platforms such as airbnb. One

important finding was that reputation systems on these platforms do not reduce ethnic inequality because the chances to build up positive reputations are not equal to begin with.³³ Further discrimination studies include papers on carpooling platforms³⁴, wedding venues³⁵, the housing market³⁶, and state welfare offices³⁷.

Cluster 5: Conflict and Cohesion

Migration and immigrant integration are important sources of political conflict and polarization in Western immigration countries. We look at these conflicts again from two angles: the one of tendencies towards authoritarianism and extremism within immigrant communities, and the one of hostile reactions to immigration and immigrants from the side of members of the host society. Regarding the former, we focus on religious fundamentalism, which has spread across Muslim-majority countries since the 1970s and been a major source thereof of authoritarianism, civil war, and terrorist violence. These developments have also spilled over into the migration context in the form of Islamist religious organizations, fundamentalist attitudes among migrants living in Europe, and the violent radicalization of some young Muslims (some of whom have in turn contributed to an intensification of conflicts in origin regions by travelling there to fight for Islamist terror groups).

In the project “Religious fundamentalism and radicalization in comparative perspective” we seek to analyze religious fundamentalism and its connections to hostility towards outgroups, violence legitimization, and participation in terror networks in a cross-religion and cross-national framework. The project includes the Religious Fundamentalism and Radicalization (RFR) survey of three religious groups (Muslims, Christians, and Jews) in Germany, the United States, Turkey, North and South Cyprus, Lebanon, Israel and Palestine, and Kenya). Using a survey experiment we could show that exposure to violence-legitimizing scriptural quotes raises support for religious violence, particularly among those who adhere to a fundamentalist interpretation of their faith.³⁸ Other papers analyzed the connection between religious fundamentalism and hostility towards religious outgroups³⁹, as well as to those who leave their religion.⁴⁰ A paper on radicalization in Kenya highlighted the role of social relations.⁴¹ These also play a central role in Eylem Kanol’s dissertation “Understanding Islamist radicalization” in the context of the project. Using original and detailed biographical data on almost 1,200 jihadist individuals in Germany, France, and the United Kingdom, he could refute several popular assumptions about Islamist radicals. For instance, “lone wolf” and “online radicalization” paths were in fact quite rare: most were recruited through Islamist social networks, family

members, and radical mosques. Another remarkable finding was that unemployment and school drop-out were often a result of radicalization, rather than its precursor.⁴²

As an ideology, religious fundamentalism is not limited to jihadism. In his dissertation project „Liberal-Democratic Attitudes and Religious Fundamentalism Among Muslim Immigrants”, Dario Portong investigates the diffusion of authoritarian attitudes associated with religious fundamentalism into the immigration context, and how this is affected by selective migration and host-country acculturation. To this end, he combines data from the World Values Survey, and our own TRANSMIT and RFR surveys. In certain cases, fundamentalist ideology may legitimate intimidation and violence against those who deviate from its norms. In a collaborative project with Laurens Buijs of the University of Amsterdam, Tommaso Virgili will combine interview data and police statistics on violence against homosexuals to investigate the degree to which perpetrators are motivated by extremist religious ideology. Virgili’s research also addresses the organizational level, where Islamist organizations often play an important role in Muslim communities because of their resourceful ties to regimes and movements in countries of origin.⁴³ Against these Islamist tendencies, reform movements attempt to carve out space for a liberal Islam. With a planned seminar series on “Liberalism and Islam in Contemporary Societies”, Tommaso Virgili and Ruud Koopmans want to offer a podium for these voices.

Together with the WZB’s Center for Civil Society Research, the Department is a partner in the large collaborative research project “Monitoringsystem und Transferplattform Radikalisierung” (MOTRA), funded by the German Federal Ministry of Education and Research and the Federal Ministry of the Interior.⁴⁴ The project focuses on both Islamist and right-wing extremism, as well as processes of radicalization in other social movements, such as corona protests. In this context, Eylem Kanol is in the process of expanding the data from his dissertation research to include additional Islamist, as well as right-wing extremists in Germany. Further elements of the project are survey experiments on drivers of intergroup hostility and support for extremist violence, and an analysis of data of the Federal Criminal Police Office (Bundeskriminalamt) on politically motivated crimes between 2010 and 2020.

Other research within the Department focusing on right-wing populism included a study by Max Schaub providing causal evidence on the effect of the diffusion of broadband internet and voting for populist parties in Germany and Italy⁴⁵; a vignette study by Marc Helbling showing that rejection of Muslim compared to Christian immigrants in the United Kingdom is not a matter of religion or even of religiosity per se, but of fundamentalist versus other forms of religiosity⁴⁶; and several papers on attitudes towards asylum seekers⁴⁷. Right-wing extremism is also at the centre of the WZB bridging

project “Against elites, against outsiders”, which was led by Heiko Giebler of the democracy Department and MIT’s Susanne Veit, and also included Magdalena Hirsch.⁴⁸

That the rise of populism is part of the emergence of a wider socio-political cleavage was the claim advanced in the WZB bridging project “The political sociology of cosmopolitanism and communitarianism” (together with the democracy and transnational governance Departments) which culminated in the common book publication *The Struggle over Borders: Cosmopolitanism and Communitarianism*.⁴⁹ The Department’s contribution to the project involved the theoretical framework⁵⁰, a claim analysis of news media in Germany, Poland, Turkey, the United States, and Mexico⁵¹, as well as a survey among elites in various sectors of society in these countries, as well as on the European and global levels⁵².

Conflicts and prejudices among cultural groups can also reduce solidarity, trust and the potential for cooperation in diverse societies. This has been a long-standing focus of the Department’s research. In the reporting period, it included a study by Merlin Schaeffer and Joscha Legewie using geocoded 311 complaint calls in New York City that showed that conflicts among neighbors were most likely to occur at the boundaries between ethnically homogenous neighborhoods, suggesting it is the combination of segregation and diversity that drives conflict.⁵³ Merlin Schaeffer also published a widely-cited meta-analysis of research on the connection between ethnic diversity and social trust⁵⁴, and together with Ruud Koopmans an analysis of German data suggesting that reduced trust in diverse neighbourhoods results from a combination of outgroup biases and (perceptions of) diverging preferences and communication problems.⁵⁵ As Max Schaub showed in several papers, the negative connection between ethnic diversity and social trust is partly a result of composition effects: immigrants tend to be poorer and poor people are less trustful, especially amongst themselves.⁵⁶ In addition, immigrants tend to come from countries with lower levels of trust, which is partly transferred into the immigration context.⁵⁷ Another study addressed the effects of ethnic conflict on trust. Using evidence from the aftermath of the deadly 2010 ethnic riots in Osh, Kyrgyzstan, Max Schaub and his colleagues showed that interethnic violence reduces trust, not only between ethnic groups, but also within them.⁵⁸

Corona-related research across clusters

The Department also conducted research on aspects of the corona pandemic related to our topics of interest. These are spread out across the research clusters, but presented here separately to highlight how we reacted to this unanticipated research challenge. Julia Stier wrote a paper on corona songs as a means to disseminate information about the pandemic among Senegalese migrants.⁵⁹ Ruud Koopmans analyzed the effects of restrictions to international travel on the early spread of the pandemic, revealing considerable inhibiting effects of early entry restrictions and obligatory quarantines of travelers.⁶⁰ In the context of the MOTRA project, Eylem Kanol and colleagues analyzed the characteristics of supporters of corona protests.⁶¹ Magdalena Hirsch used survey data from Germany and Spain to show that support for authoritarian rule and ostracizing and punishing of dissenters are stronger when they are linked to pressing social problems such as climate change and the corona pandemic, particularly among those who do not subscribe to authoritarian rule and intolerance in the abstract.⁶² Daniel Auer used data from a rolling online survey that the Department conducted from April to December 2020 to show that, controlling for sectoral and occupational differences, immigrants were much more likely to be laid off when firms had to reduce their workforce during the pandemic.⁶³ Marc Helbling used the survey to implement a conjoint experiment on the difficult moral issue of triage that was highly salient during the early stages of the pandemic: who should receive life-saving COVID-19 treatment if treatment capacities are limited? Helbling and colleagues provided strong evidence that German respondents consider resident non-citizens substantially less deserving of such treatment than citizens.⁶⁴ More papers based on the Department's corona survey are in preparation or under review.
